The Six Nations of the Grand River Economic Development Trust (EDT) is the mechanism in which surplus profits generated by SNGRDC are invested into the collective betterment of the Six Nations people and community. *As of December 2024, SNGRDC has transferred \$26.8M to the EDT*, of which EDT has invested over \$23.3 million into community priorities. The remaining funds will be used for future rounds of applicants.

For example, additional payroll generates spending within a prescribed area which in-turn fuels further economic growth. The 1.25x factor is a very conservative factor used by economists.
